**\*A critical element of professional policing is ensuring the response to resistance we use is appropriate, legal, within policy, reviewed for improvement and enhanced training and supervised. Below is an abbreviated summary of the instances of our response to resistance to arrest:**

Two officers observed a male subject riding a bicycle westbound near a local tire shop. Believing the individual to be a person wanted by another police department, they attempted to initiate contact for identification. The officers activated their patrol vehicle's emergency lights, used an airhorn, and issued verbal commands instructing the subject to stop. The individual disregarded these efforts and continued riding away. The subject proceeded westbound along a nearby roadway, at which point one of the officers maneuvered ahead of him and exited the patrol vehicle to intercept. The officer physically removed the fleeing subject from the bicycle to bring him into custody. During the encounter, the subject sustained abrasions to his head and elbows, while the officer suffered scrapes to his palms and lower leg, along with damage to his uniform. The subject complained of stomach pain, and emergency medical services were called to the scene. He was transported to a local hospital, treated, and subsequently released. Following the incident, the subject was charged with resisting a peace officer.

and obstructing identification. Additionally, he had two outstanding felony warrants for possession of methamphetamine.

An officer observed a male subject walking in the roadway on a busy highway, outside of a designated crosswalk, posing a potential traffic hazard. The officer made contact and issued verbal commands for the individual to stop walking away. The subject disregarded these commands and continued walking in the roadway. The officer physically guided the subject off the roadway into a grassy area near a public transit station. During this encounter, the subject attempted to pull away. The officer gave clear verbal commands indicating the subject was under arrest and instructed him to place his hands behind his back. When the subject refused to comply, the officer brought him to the ground to gain control. While on the ground, the officer was able to secure the subject in handcuffs. The officer noted a strong odor of alcohol coming from the subject's breath. A minor abrasion was observed on the subject's forehead, likely from contact with the ground during the arrest. He appeared unsteady and emitted a strong odor of alcohol. The subject was placed in a holding cell to sober up and was cited for public intoxication and resisting a peace officer.

While responding to a reported domestic battery, officers identified a vehicle matching the suspect's description leaving the scene. Given the complainant had stated the suspect was armed with a firearm, officers initiated a high-risk traffic stop. With weapons drawn for safety, officers ordered the driver out of the vehicle and safely took the subject into custody. Upon inspection, a small child was found seated in the front seat of the vehicle. A firearm was recovered from the glove box. The subject was charged with Aggravated Unlawful Use of a Weapon and Endangering the Welfare of a Child, felonies.

While conducting surveillance on a known fugitive wanted for firearm-related offenses, officers observed the subject at a local gas station. As officers approached, the subject attempted to flee. One officer positioned their Taser in a warning stance, ordering the subject to comply or face being tased. Simultaneously, a pursuing officer was able to physically apprehend the subject and place him in handcuffs without the use of force. The subject, who had active felony warrants, was taken into custody without further incident.

While on patrol, an officer observed a male subject walking along Lincoln Highway and attempted to conduct a pedestrian check after determining he had active felony arrest warrants. The subject fled on foot, leading officers on a foot pursuit through a commercial and residential area. Multiple officers gave loud and clear verbal commands for the subject to stop, which were ignored. As the subject continued running toward a residence, a Taser was deployed at approximately 30 feet, but was ineffective due to movement and distance. The subject entered a nearby residence, where officers made contact with a resident who granted consent for entry. Inside, officers located the subject and took him into custody after a brief physical struggle. The subject was restrained until he ceased resisting, then handcuffed and searched incident to arrest. He was later transported, processed, and issued a citation for resisting along with the felony arrest warrants for retail theft. The subject reported minor injuries that did not require medical treatment, and photographs were taken for documentation. Witnesses at the residence confirmed officers did not use excessive force and that consent was given for their entry.
